



Dear Tony,

My dear friend, as I have thought about the love and friendship that has developed between us - it breaks my heart to acknowledge - as it will yours - that the two moments when we grew closest together were the deaths of Betty Jo Dobbs and my dear Susan. When Jo died Paula Finkler reached out to you and suddenly you were joining my Dissertation Committee. (1993 was just before email so texts were what I was anticipating as "speedy" contact and expression of the other.) But it was your generosity in being willing to help what was - and sorely remains - the smallest figure in your intellectual galaxy. I shake my head still at how kind, generous - but also wonderfully critical of my dissertation - you were.

Some years passed in relative silence but in the summer of ~~2004~~ we found ourselves at the Huntington and it was there where we really got to know one another. (My sweet Georgie who was at our feet at Burger Continental is 14 this week!) We laughed and really enjoyed each other's company.

I think it was only two weeks after that week that I learned Susan had an inoperable tumor on her leg. That was August 2. She died October 19.

You were so kind. You emailed me throughout the day, telling me you could not keep from thinking of us, offering

to contact my teen, get me time I might need. You did or it just wanted to do anything you could. You did a lot my friend. Knowing you had my back was priceless.

And that's what you're doing: You're had my back. You're got up your shield, leveled your sword and done whatever you could do to look out for me. You know I am a man of faith and Christians believe that grace is the love God has for us that we, as sinners, do not deserve. Your life, to me - and, as this weekend confirms, to hundreds of others - is a living testament of grace. Wouldn't you rabi be proud?!

As a sinner, I have not always lived up to the grace you taught me but, slow learner that I am, I am catching up on your lessons. I'll never be the master you are, but I can come close.

Of course I want to make you proud of me intellectually. But if that was all I did, I think I would have been an average - at best - student of yours. I want you to be proud of me someday because I red as hard, as generous, as loving as you are.




